Jesus

"She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:21

Solomon tells us in Proverbs 22:1 that "a good name is to be chosen rather than great riches." For Solomon, a name is a connection to your character. It doesn't just identify someone, it tells us a story. We should desire a good name, a good character, because that is of incredible worth – apparently more valuable than great riches.

If this is true of anyone, so much more this true of the Son of God. His many names and titles given to Him through the Scriptures tells us of His character, and therefore, the character of God. After all, Jesus said, "if you have seen me, you've seen the Father" (John 14:9). To know Jesus, is to know the essence and character of God.

Therefore, it makes sense to begin our Advent of considering His names to begin with the name God desires the incarnate Son of God to carry: Jesus. The words of Matthew 1:21 are from the angel Gabriel to Joseph, and if the names of Jesus are to tell us of His character and of the nature of God, we are overjoyed that this is the name that is chosen.

He is Jesus, "for he will save his people from their sins." The essence of Jesus' character is to be savior. To rescue you from sin is central the character of God and His Son. It is better for US than riches that God's Son is given this highest of all names. Other names and titles accurately describe Him – Holy One, Lion of Judah, King of Kings – and we will consider them in the days ahead. But we will hear them all with the name Jesus ringing in our ears. He is holy, but since He is Jesus, He comes to share His holiness with us sinners. He is a Lion, but as savior, He doesn't devour us, but uses His power and strength to defeat sin, death and the devil. He is the King of Kings, but still Jesus, the Savior, so He will take up a crown of thorns to reign in forgiveness and mercy. He is always Jesus, our Savior.

Prayer – Lord Jesus, prepare my heart for the celebration of Your coming through the forgiveness of my sins. Amen.

The Resurrection and the Life

"Jesus said to (Martha), "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die." John 11:25-26

"Where is the one who is born, King of the Jews?" Matthew 2:2

Light of the World

"The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world." John 1:9

As a child and often today, the darkness of night bothers my frail heart. Night lights and lit TV screens only bring temporal comfort in the frightening pitch-darkness of the night. In the dark world, our hearts and flesh are corrupted in sin, and sin is frightening, but we are not left in the dark. Jesus is the true light and life come into the world for us. His true light eternally saves and comforts our hearts with faith in His life, death, and resurrection given for us. Jesus assures us and says, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12).

Jesus Christ, the true light and life of men has come in the world for everyone by the will of God: "to all who did receive Him, who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God." (john 1:12-13)

Just as the world needs sunlight, we need the light of Christ. After all, "in regard to spiritual and divine matters Scripture labels people by nature 'darkness' (Eph. 5:[8]; Acts 26:[18]; John 1:[5]: 'The light shines in the darkness (that is, in the dark, blind world, which does not know or grasp God), and the darkness did not comprehend it.' . . . people who are spiritually dead in sins cannot on the basis of their own strength dispose themselves or turn themselves toward appropriate spiritual, heavenly righteousness and life, if the Son of God has not made them alive and freed them from the death of sin" (Formula of Concord, SD, Article II:10, 11).

Jesus' light shines in the darkness to us through the Gospel bringing redemption and forgiveness of sins through faith. Jesus' blood frees us from the power of sin, death, and Satan. God's Word declares to us: "This is the message we have heard from Him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in Him is no darkness at all . . . if we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin" (I John 1:5, 7).

Prayer – Light of the world, Your blood cleanses us from all sin, grant us peace in the midst of darkness and bring us Your light and life which comforts us in our weakness. In Your name. Amen

Christ/Messiah

"and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he (Herod) inquired of them where the Christ was to be born." Matthew 2:4

The history of the Jewish people in the centuries leading up to the birth of our Lord was dominated by the hope of the coming of the new king, God's anointed one, the Messiah or Christ (both words refer to the anointing that marked the installation of a king). This hope was amplified because the Exile was fresh in the minds of Israel. The people had lost their king and were, for all intents and purposes, no longer a nation. The hope of the Christ was not initially that he would forgive sins but that he would restore the kingdom of Israel.

This is why Herod was so interested in getting rid of the newborn Christ: he was a threat to the Roman authority in the region which backed up Herod's power. Of course, we as Christians have the luxury of knowing that the fulfillment of God's promises concerning the Messiah are much greater than simply a great temporal ruler. The Christ came to bring a Kingdom, to be sure, but His Kingdom is not of this world. Our Christ certainly came to overthrow tyranny and bring freedom, not from the power of Rome or any worldly rule but from the tyranny of sin and death that burdened Israel and the whole world since the Fall. He came to depose Satan and overthrow all evil.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, we thank You that You sent Your Son to be our Anointed One, our Christ. We thank You that You have overthrown the tyranny of death and brought life to Your people. Rule in our hearts so that we might live according to Your rule and begin today our eternal life in Your Kingdom. Teach us to worship You as King and look to Your second coming when Your Kingdom will become undeniably clear to all. We pray this in the name of our Your Son, our Christ. Come quickly, Lord. Amen!

<u>Timothy 2:5-6</u>

Word

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. John 1:1, 14

"In the beginning was the Word." John began his Gospel with these words. He purposely began the same way the Old Testament begins, "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1)

John says to us that Jesus already existed at that time. He is eternal like His Father. Through him, everything has come into existence. When He came into the world on Christmas Eve, he came to His own, to the world He Himself created. I, too, belong to this world. Even I have been made by the Savior's hand. Nothing has come into being without Him. He has a purpose for my life.

But why does John call Him the Word? An entire book could be written about this. There is a similarity between Christ and the Word. God's Word isn't just "empty words," it is not the mere names for things. It's a creative Word, full of God's power, of His Spirit and life. When it emanates from God, God is a part of it. Therefore, the Word can give everything God can give. It's the same way with Christ. All that God is and has, will and does, lives in Christ. The creed says He is "the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of light, very God of very God, begotten not made, being of one substance with the Father."

We need to keep this in mind to get an idea of what is implied by "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Here flesh means whatever is created, whatever consists of molecules and atoms, the same kind of molecules and atoms that are found in the air and the water, stone, and clay. The Creator became a part of His creation. The Lord of the whole world made His dwelling in a man's body. God's Son became a human child – so we could become God's children. Through this great miracle an even greater miracle has become possible: God can dwell in our hearts with His eternal life.

Prayer - Lord Jesus, I pray to You now for a great miracle: that You be born in my heart also and make Yourself at home with everything You've brought with You from Your Father. Lord, it is the greatest and most incomprehensible of all miracles that You, with Your glory and Your love, with Your purity and Your zeal, would be able to live in me, a sinner. Holy One of God

"And we have believed, and have come to know, that you are the Holy One of God." John 6:69

The sinful world can hardly understand holy. Indefinitely and apart from Christ Jesus, not one can see or believe in the true holiness of God, and His love given for the world in Christ. The world Holy belongs to God and not the fallen world. Yet, the world is not left without hope. The *Holy One of God*, Jesus Christ, the Son of God, has been sent into the world to redeem the world.

Peter confesses Jesus is the *Holy One of God* who has the words of eternal life. *Holy One* identifies Jesus as the Messiah and the Son of the living God: This confession of faith in Jesus the Messiah, the Son of and *Holy One of God* can be seen throughout the New Testament. Even demons recognize Jesus as the *Holy One of God*.

Jesus speaks of eternal life He gives to those who hear His voice and follow Him: At the Feast of Dedication at Jerusalem at the temple, in the colonnade of Solomon, Jesus was asked if he was the Christ. He says He and the Father are one, "of Him whom the Father consecrated [hallowed] and sent into the world" (John 10:36). Many wanted to stone Him to death, arrest Him, and "many believed in Him there" (John 10:42)

We confess our belief in the Nicene Creed that Jesus is True and Holy God, one with the Father:

"I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ [Messiah], the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of the Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very [true] God of very [true] God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by whom all things were made; who for us men, and for our salvation, came down from heaven, and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary, and was made man, and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate; He suffered and was buried; and the third day He rose again according to the Scriptures; and ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of the Father; and He shall come again with glory to judge the quick and the dead; whose kingdom shall have no end."

The *Holy One of God* come into the world has redeemed us from sin, death, and the devil on a cross.

Prayer – Holy One of God, Lord Jesus Christ. You have come for us in the flesh; suffered, died, and rose again, freeing us from the bondage of sin and death, bringing eternal Life in Your name. Grant us grace and strength to trust in You always as You live in us. For, You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Lord of Lords

"He who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords, 16 who alone has immortality, who dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see. To him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen." 1 Timothy 6:15-16

Paul charges Timothy "to keep the commandment unstained and free from reproach until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ" and presents the following litany of Christ's titles as both praise and warning. It is impossible to overstate the sovereignty of our God and we should both rejoice and tremble at His coming. Advent is a season where we both remember the Incarnation of our Lord and look forward to His Second Coming when His Lordship over every lord is made apparent.

In our times, it can seem like God is powerless against the lords of our world. Human tyrants wage horrific wars and oppress the weak in unspeakable poverty. Natural disasters leave thousands homeless or worse, and the present pandemic is only the latest among countless diseases that disrupt or even end lives. In the eyes of the world, God seems impotent or, worse, uncaring. But we who are believers worship a God who delights in flouting expectations. He appears to be useless in the face of tragedy but we know that He is at work in all things as Lord of all things.

Our Lord of lords appeared as the helpless infant child of a newlywed couple born in a manger surrounded by lowly animals. Our God walked and lived among us for decades as a humble day laborer. The Everlasting One was condemned and killed with petty thieves. Yet in all of these things, He was the Lord above every lord. In his resurrection, God demonstrated that Jesus Christ's words were faithful: He was the Son of God, King over all things. Knowing that He is risen from the dead, we can be confident that there is no lord or king who has any power in comparison to our Lord of lords.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, we thank You that You rule all things through Your great might. Reign as Lord in us that we might do Your will in all our endeavors. Lord of lords, teach us to remember Your power that we might not question Your rule but boldly proclaim it. Train our eyes to look for the Second Coming that we may prepare ourselves for the coming consummation of the Lordship of Jesus Christ in Whose name we pray, Amen.

The Names of Jesus

Author and Perfecter of Our Faith

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God." Hebrews 12: 1-2

What rich, deep titles for our Lord and Savior: "Author and Perfecter of our Faith!" Both these words have multiple nuances and, in the case of Jesus, can be viewed from more than one angle. Jesus' Spirit puts the seed of faith into our hearts and makes it grow and flourish and bear fruit. He creates, or "founds" our faith. As an author creates a story – a whole world, complete with people and places – out of nothing, Jesus created life in us where there was only death.

But He's also the Author of the reason for our new life – He authored our salvation by being born as a human infant, living a holy life, and suffering and dying for our sins. Just as He authored the world itself, He authored you and me in our mother's womb. He went on to author faith in us at our baptism, thereby authoring our adoption by His heavenly Father. And even now, He is authoring places for us to live with Him in heaven.

"Perfecter" may be an odd title, but is perfectly fitting for Jesus! Not only does he create faith in us, He makes that faith perfect. As He said, "whoever sees me sees him who sent me." If we didn't know Jesus, we wouldn't know the Father and our faith would be futile. Our faith would be ludicrous, absurd if God didn't know us through Jesus. Our faith could only be partial, blurred, and pointless if we didn't know the Father by knowing His Son. And, our now-perfect faith bears fruit rather than filthy rags, as we love our neighbors as Jesus loves us.

Prayer - Heavenly Father, continue to point us to Your Son as the subject of our faith, as the Author of our faith, and as the One who makes our faith complete. In His holy Name, Amen.

Great High Priest

"Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." Hebrews 4:14-16

The role of priest seems very distant to us. The notion of a high priest seems even further removed from us. But there is incredible comfort in Jesus being our great high priest.

He has passed through the heavens. Once a year on the day of atonement, the high priest would pass through the curtain into the Holy of Holies, the very dwelling place of God among His people. There, he would make a sacrifice for the payment of the people's sins for that year. We have a high priest who has passed through heaven itself in order to come and be THE great sacrifice for our sins.

Yet He is not aloof from us and our concerns. He is able "to sympathize with our weaknesses" because He "in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin." He knows our struggles. He has experienced the desire to sin and rebel against God from the inside, not merely as an observer. Yet He withstood every temptation, for us and for our salvation.

From these truths about our great high priest, we are encouraged to do two things. (1) "Hold fast to our confession." Cling to Jesus, THE great high priest who alone can save us. (2) "With confidence draw near to the throne of grace." Our Savior is able and ready to help us in trial, forgive us when we fall, strengthen us for the difficult road of faithfulness, that He knows Himself. So cling to the truth of Jesus, Son of God and Savior AND always know that you can come before Him confessing your sins and weaknesses knowing you will "receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need."

Prayer – Dear Jesus, the great High priest, take my sin, give to me Your life and forgiveness, and strengthen me to endure trials through Your grace. Amen.

"I am the vine, and my Father is the vinedresser...I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing." John 15:1, 5

I have never been much of a gardener. However, I do know a little about plants. And I know that one of the most important parts of plants that have vines, is the vine itself. Prince of Peace

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and of peace there will be no end" (Isaiah 9:6-7a)

Peace in our lives today may seem very distant or very near. Living peaceably with others may be difficult when sinful thoughts and actions toward others are anything but quiet and peaceful. Martin Luther writes, "In the kingdom of Christ there is grace, comfort, forgiveness of sins, joy, peace. He does not deal with the transgressor in sternness, but as a father. The forgiveness of sins is justification, and peace follows justification" (Luther's Works, vol. 16:10).

The *Prince of Peace*, Jesus Christ, reconciled us to God through His precious blood shed for us on a cross. Only through Jesus, we have peace without end, the forgiveness of sins, and hope in His name, now and forever.

The Image of God

"In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God." 2 Corinthians 4:4

"He's got his mother's eyes"; "she's got dad's nose (poor thing!)" If you saw pictures of my Mom's brothers, you'd know I came from that family (it's the "Degner chin"). It's kind of nice to know we "fit" with our family. So what does it mean that Jesus is "the image of God"?

In the Bible, the Hebrew and Greek words translated as "image" go beyond what immediately comes to our English-speaking mind. Greek uses the word – "icon". With modern electronics, you have a screen full of icons, each looking unique and representing an app or file. That's what "image" means in the Bible – something that resembles something else and is its/his at-the-ready representative.

Images of pagan gods were condemned in the Bible as representations of false gods – not that the idol itself was made poorly or of bad materials, but that it was dangerous – something that pointed people to a false god. Adam and Eve were created "in the image of God", meaning that they were created "above the angels" and have dominion over the earth on God's behalf.

There's a difference between being made in the image of God and *being* the image of God. Jesus is the patter – the mold – from which every person is made. That means that all people have at least a trace of God's image by having His Law written on their hearts, along with hints of His many qualities (goodness, mercy, justice, etc.). This diminished image is because sin ruined our "view" of God when it entered the world.

Fortunately, as the Image of God, Jesus has all the same qualities as the Father – perfectly. He is the "icon" of goodness, mercy, righteousness, grace, and love. And He's God's representative to us – not just as a passive "point of contact" with a distant God, but as God's mighty right arm who fights the devil, wins salvation, and brings us His Spirit. We have faith because He's God's Image, and that faith (at least partially in this life) restores the image in which we were created.

God is not some "faceless god". He wraps Himself into His Creation through His Son so we can see and know Him. God's face is Jesus, through whom we know God's goodness, join His family, and enter His kingdom. And, living in that kingdom even now, you and I are God's face to the world around us.

Lord God, thank You for sending us Your "Poster Child", Jesus. Help us to see Your Image through Him and to be Your Image to our neighbors. In Jesus' holy Name, Amen.

Good Shepherd

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." John 10:11

Shepherds did not always have the best reputation in the ancient world. They could be less than honest, not always hard working (especially if they were only hired hands), and they smelled like sheep. Yet Jesus refers to himself as the good shepherd. In contrast to all others, he was not just good at being a shepherd, but He defined good. And as a shepherd He was completely devoted.

The good shepherd cares for His sheep: He finds pastures that are lush and green, He protects them from dangers (both attackers and the kind sheep would wander into), He binds up their wounds.

The good shepherd knows His sheep. He calls them by name and they recognize His voice. He knows which sheep are prone to stray and how to go after them.

The good shepherd leads His sheep. They are followers. Sheep are notoriously getting into trouble. The good shepherd goes ahead to make a way for the sheep.

Lots of other shepherds may do some of these things, but THE good shepherd also lays down His life for the sheep. He will do anything in order to protect and rescue His sheep.

This is our Good Shepherd. He cares for you and provides all you have for this life and life eternal. He knows you and has called you by name to be His own in baptism. Your Good Shepherd leads you. He asks only for you to listen to His voice in His Word. But most of all, He is the one who was born in order to lay down His life for you. He will do anything in order to rescue you from the predators of sin, death and Satan — and He has.

This is your Good Shepherd who leads you today and always.

Prayer – Dear Good Shepherd, help me to listen to Your voice and find comfort that You know me, care for me and have laid down Your life for me. Amen.

Son of Man

(Jesus said), "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." Mark 10:45

Son of God

"This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, 'Out of Egypt I called my son'... When the centurion and those who were with him, keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were filled with awe and said, 'Truly this was the Son of God!'" (Matthew 2:15; 27:54)

Joseph - warned by an angel of the Lord in a dream, flees to Egypt with the Christ child and His mother - Mary. They flee from King Herod, searching to kill the child who was "born king of the Jews" (Matt 2:2). Moved by the Holy Spirit, the Apostle Matthew records the fulfillment of God's Son Jesus called out of Egypt. Israel was referred to as God's son, to whom He was a loving Father, as the prophet writes: "When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son" (Hosea 11:1; see Exod 4:22-23). The Israelites (most often wayward) calling and exodus out of Egypt foreshadows Jesus Christ, God's only begotten Son.

We see much later in Matthew's account, the Christ child was grown and sentenced to death for blasphemy: "the high priest said to him, 'I adjure you by the living God, tell us if you are the Christ, the Son of God.' Jesus said to him, 'You have said so. But I tell you, from now on you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of Power and coming on the clouds of heaven.' Then the high priest tore his robes and said, "He has uttered blasphemy. What further witnesses do we need? You have now heard his blasphemy. What is your judgment?" They answered, 'He deserves death'" (Matt 26:62-66).

At Jesus' crucifixion, witnesses including a centurion watched over Jesus dying on a cross. They watched Jesus with the charge written above and against Him; "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews" (Matt 27:37). Watching Jesus crying out in a loud voice giving up His spirit, the earth shaking and rocks splitting, they confess, "Truly this was the Son of God" (v. 54).

The eternal *Son of God* (perfect, holy, and righteous) born and called out of Egypt; fulfilled what was written and spoken of by the prophets; was crucified and risen for the forgiveness of sins by His body and blood given and shed for you!

Glory to God in highest heaven,
Who unto us His Son hath given!
While angels sing with pious mirth
A glad new year to all the earth.

("From Heaven Above to Earth I Come," TLH 85, verse 15)

Lamb of God

"The next day (John the Baptist) saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" John 1:29

On this Christmas day, we ponder the words of John the Baptist when Jesus appeared at the beginning of His ministry: "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" Today, we celebrate the coming of the Lamb of God into the world. He came into a sinful world to redeem the whole world from our sin. Although we are familiar with the phrase in the Scriptures and the liturgy, what do we mean when we say Lamb of God? What did John mean?

The first Old Testament passage that comes to mind in the sacrifice of Isaac when Isaac asks his father, Abraham, where the animal for sacrifice was. Abraham said that God Himself would provide the lamb for an offering. He was shown to be right not only in that particular instance but in a much greater way. God not only provided a Lamb for the sins of the world, God took on flesh to become Himself the Lamb of God. This is truly an amazing gift for this Christmas day, but in His extravagant grace God has given even another vision of how we can look at the Lamb of God. In Revelation, the Apostle John sees another aspect of the Lamb of God. In Revelation 5, John writes of his vision of the glorious and victorious Lamb who has been slain. The Lamb came not only to be a humble sacrifice, but to rise victorious and rule forever. How blessed are we that the Lamb has come for us!

Prayer: Everlasting Father, we thank you today for the great gift You gave millennia ago and the gift that You continue to give to us. Teach us to behold the Lamb of God as He continually takes away our sins. Give us hearts to celebrate His coming and to behold His victorious reign. In Your Son's holy and precious name we pray, Amen.

Amen

"And to the angel of the church in Laodicea write: 'The words of the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of God's creation." Revelation 3:14

This devotion concludes our brief look at just *some* of the many Names of Jesus. And this Name – "Amen" – in many ways is the "last word" in the list. "Amen" comes to English, Arabic, and many other modern languages from a Hebrew word that meant "to be steady, faithful, true". In Deuteronomy, it's used by the people of Israel as a response to God's words of Law and Gospel to them: "And all the people shall say, 'Amen.'" They were saying that God's promises to them, as just spoken, are good and true statements with which they agree. They were "signing the contract" with God by agreeing with His covenant with them.

"Amen" is closely tied to worship in both testaments of the Bible, as both blessings and praise conclude with that word: "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting! Amen and Amen." Paul concludes many of his greetings with an "Amen" to testify to the truthfulness of God's message for them. "Amen" is literally the final word of the Bible. In the 12th century it was first used as an English word, and a few hundred years later, Martin Luther translated it as, "this is most certainly true".

But in our reading (above) we're told that "Amen" is a Name for Jesus. When you think about it, what could be more fitting? That a simple, short, Hebrew word would be used to describe the Word of God? That a word that means "steady, faithful, true" would be applied the One Who came to "bear witness to the truth"? Who was, "the Way, the Truth, and the Life"?

There's a reason that "Jesus" is the answer to almost every question in a children's sermon. There's a reason that in many Christian churches the word "Amen!" is shouted out after a particularly truthful statement. Jesus is God's signature, His "Amen", on the covenant He's made with you and me – that "I will by your God, and you shall be My people". Jesus is the "Amen" through whom our prayers rise to be a fragrant offering before His heavenly Father. And Jesus is the "Amen" through whom God's steady, faithful, and true promises come to us. Amen!

Lord Jesus, with Your "Amen" You have saved us from our sins and brought us into Your Kingdom! Keep us forever strong in You. In Your holy Name, Amen and Amen.
